COMPLETION REPORT

Philanthropy and Japanese retirees in Bali

This project proposed to look at the philanthropic activities of Japanese retirees residing in Bali. A number of these activities exist and are based in major centers of the island – places like Denpasar, Singaraja, Sanur, and Ubud. They range from healthcare (eg., setting up of midwife clinics), education (eg., setting up Japanese language schools and children libraries), developmental assistance (eg., donation of water-tanks to village neighborhoods [*banjars]*), and raising awareness of the environment. In particular, Japanese retirees have provided leadership in setting up groups providing environmental education and organizing joint activities in the replanting of mangrove and upland forests in places like Sanur and Kintamani.

Perhaps the most well-known of these is "Clean Up Bali" (CUB). CUB was founded by members of the Japan Club in 2008, and now mainly led by Japanese retirees. This group concentrates on educating high school children on environmental issues through the Japanese-inspired card game ("Bali Eco Kartu"), organizing clean-up activities in local village neighborhoods (*banjars*), and the replanting of mangrove forests. Some of their activities are partially subsidized by corporations and businesses based in Japan in the form of funds to purchase things like seedlings and other materials.

Why have my Japanese retiree informants chosen to initiate these activities? The key reason is that they have more free time in comparison to other Japanese long-stay residents who have businesses to run and families to raise in Bali. Secondly, they said they feel an obligation to "give back" to Bali, a place which has provided them with a good quality of life in their old age. "Giving back" for them means helping to address some of the developmental needs of Balinese and helping to maintain various aspects of Bali that have attracted them in the first place.

My Japanese retiree informants have chosen to focus on environmental issues because they are concerned by mass tourism and rapid development making Bali less attractive and liveable. In particular, there has been an escalation of the waste problem as well as the destruction of upland forests contributing to the depletion of water resources in Bali.

For my Japanese retiree informants, by organizing these activities and getting Balinese communities involved in them, they have benefited by developing a closer understanding of Balinese culture and society beyond the tourist veneer. They have also developed lasting working relationships and, in some cases, friendships with various Balinese individuals beyond the Japanese community. Their residence in Bali has become more meaningful through these social relationships.

For my Balinese informants who have been the recipients of these activities, they appreciate the willingness of the Japanese community in Bali to want to help address problems. The material aid that they receive are not always readily forthcoming from the local government because of the lack of resources and different priorities. Additionally, many of them say that they have individually picked up valuable knowledge, skills and working habits through these collaborative encounters with the Japanese retirees. In turn, they have used to these experiences to better themselves and to help improve their own families, places of work, and local neighborhoods.
