Alternative Feminist Imaginaries: The Sino-Japanese Leftist Feminism(1890-1930) at the Turn of the Twentieth Century

Thanks to the generous help of the Sumitomo Foundation, my research advanced greatly during the research period (April 1, 2016 to March 31, 2017). The past year has been a fruitful year for my dissertation research, and here I would like to focus on three aspects of this research period.

First, between June and August 2016, I conducted archival trips to China and Japan, through which I not only identified archives that host important historical sources for my dissertation research, but also gathered sources that enhanced my understanding of the emergence and development of East Asian feminism. In particular, during my archival research in Japan, I met with and received the guidance of Professor Murata Yujiro at Tokyo University. As a renowned historian in modern Chinese intellectual history, Professor Murata is very familiar with Japanese studies on modern China. He not only raised my attention to aspects of Sino-Japanese intellectual exchange that I was not yet aware of, but also pointed out key historical sources that are worth looking into. Thanks to the archival research and my meeting with Professor Murata, I have acquired a deeper understanding of the entwined relationship between East Asian feminism, on one hand, and patriarchy, imperialism, capitalism, and Pan-Asianism, on the other. I have also expanded my research to include places such as Manchuria and Taiwan in order to better understand how feminist thought and movements developed in response to the expansion of Japanese imperialism.

Second, based on my preliminary research, I presented my paper at the Thinking Gender Graduate Student Conference at University of California Los Angeles in April 2016, for which I received the Prize for the Best Academic Paper of the Conference. In my paper, I analyzed how intellectual exchange between Japanese and Chinese intellectuals deeply influenced left-wing feminism in both countries by tracing transnational dialogue between Kōtoku Shūsui, a Japanese socialist and anarchist, and He-Yin Zhen, a Chinese anarchist feminist, which was published in the Anarcho-feminist Magazine *Tianyi* (1907-1908). Feedback I received at the conference helped me realize different conceptual frameworks I could use to organize my paper as well as sources that I was unaware of and should investigate.

Third, based on the historical sources I collected in China and Japan during the summer of 2016, I reconceptualized and refined my dissertation proposal. The revised proposal received the Japanese Studies Fellowship, with which I will be able to conduct a year-long research trip in Japan starting in September 2017. I believe that my acceptance to the Japanese Studies Fellowship is inseparable from my research conducted under the sponsorship of the Sumitomo Foundation. If it were not for the generous support of the Sumitomo Foundation, I would not be able to gather historical sources that are unavailable in the United States, and neither would I have been able to further hone my research proposal. As I am preparing for my archival research in Japan, I am grateful to the support I have received from the Sumitomo Foundation. I believe that my upcoming fieldwork in Japan will allow me to discover more archival sources, based upon which I will be able to further enhance my understanding of East Asian feminism at the turn of the twentieth century.
