COMPLETION REPORT

Training and Transboundary Activities of Taiwan's Veterinarians during the Japanese Ruling Era

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This study focuses on Taiwan's veterinary medicine before 1950, to illustrate: First, training courses and overseas exchanges involving Taiwan's veterinarians, schools and organizations. Second, the duties of Taiwan's veterinarians. Third, the flow of human resources from veterinary practice to human disease technicians. Fourth, a checklist of key names of Taiwan's veterinarians and events in veterinary medicine.

During my research, I extensively visited the most important cities for veterinary history, and investigated and analyzed the materials of the related institutions. In particular, I visited: A. The History Gallery of Azabu University, and then contacted Prof. Hong Kean, Ooi and interviewed with Prof. Chitoshi Itakura, who are well known in the Asian and Japanese fields of veterinary medicine; B. Directors of Taiwan Kyokai (Tokyo), who had experience with Taiwan's and Manchuria's animal care before 1950; and C. The History Gallery of Kyushu University, where I visited Prof. Etsuro Orita, who gave me a precious name list of foreign students at Kyushu University before 1945.

The study found three points initially as below. 1. Following a long history of veterinary medicine, the modern husbandry and veterinary science of Japan began in the years 1880-1890. When Taiwan began to be ruled by Japan in 1895, modern veterinary medicine was also brought to Taiwan with the Japanese army and bureaucracy, at the same time as it was adopted in Japan. The rough technological level and educational system of Japan territory and Taiwan encouraged Taiwanese to work and study in Japan (similar situations happened in Manchuria and Korea after the 1930s). Within 10 years, Taiwanese veterinary students on government scholarships or self-financed were appearing in Tokyo, Shikoku, Kyushu etc. In the northernmost Hokkaido and Tohoku regions, many overseas students from the north part of China in the early years, while Taiwanese veterinary students showed up after the 1920s. Due both to differences in climatic conditions and animal species between Japan's northern, frigid zone and Taiwan's sub-tropical and tropical zones, as well as to species exchanges, veterinarians expanded their medical subjects. 2. There were veterinarians and 'veterinarian trainees' (講習生) in both Taiwan's and Japan's veterinarian systems. The latter were like technicians, and the former were real doctors. The trainees often changed their career, becoming doctors, microbiologists, zoologists, businessmen, etc. The former rarely switched their jobs, and they had frequent overseas contacts. 3. The Renaming Policy after the late 1930s made it difficult for researchers to identify whether veterinarians were Taiwanese nor not in class memorial books, and also made it hard for researchers to chronicle the complete overseas Taiwanese veterinarians name lists.

Through the help from your foundation and the above researchers, I focused on the aforementioned research and presented two oral papers as listed below. Now I am working on analyzing systems (institutions) and personnel (influences) with two paths, and will try to publish in professional journals in the near future.
