COMPLETION REPORT

Between Visual and Verbal Receptions: Interpreting and Promoting Ainu Folktales and Culture among Students of West Java and Bali Provinces, Indonesia

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In accordance with its title "Between Visual and Verbal Receptions: Interpreting and Promoting Ainu Folktales and Culture among Students of West Java and Bali Province, Indonesia", this study aims to introduce Ainu folklore and culture in two regions in Indonesia.

This research has been conducted according to the plan. What we have done during the research includes (1) selecting the Ainu folktales as the object of the research; (2) writing a simplified form of the Ainu folktales in Indonesian Language; (3) introducing the simplified form of the Ainu folktales to students majoring in Art and Design in Bandung (West Java) and Denpasar (Bali), two cosmopolitan provinces in Indonesia, which are the locations of the research, in order to get visual responses in illustrative forms; (4) sharing the simplified form of the Ainu folktales with Japanese and Anthropology Department students in Denpasar and Bandung in order to get their textual responses (reception). The reading process of the Ainu folktales for visual and textual responses began with the introduction and discussion about Ainu culture in general and their oral traditions in particular. The introduction of folklore was also accompanied by the introduction of the anime Golden Kamuy to add visuals and knowledge to Indonesian students and researchers.

For Indonesian readers, the Ainu story is very complex, difficult enough to comprehend by those who do not have basic knowledge and strong interest about Japan. In connection with that, the research plan which had targeted high school students was changed to the university students whose broader knowledge.

As planned, we, both as researchers, conducted a fieldwork to Hokkaido for two weeks. While in Hokkaido we visited Ainu's related libraries and observed the existence of folklore and its roles in local culture including the use of folklore for entertainment and tourist attractions. This field observations and libraries research have enriched our knowledge of the life of the Ainu oral traditions in Hokkaido.

Overall, the results of this research include the followings: (1) a draft of the simplified Ainu folklore book in Indonesian Language containing illustrations made by the Art and Design students from West Java and Bali; (2) producing two paper conferences that were published in international proceedings; (3) presenting a paper about the Ainu oral tradition in the International Conference of Japanese Literature in Taiwan in 2018 as a form of expanding the scope of Ainu promotion due to the conference attended by Japanese literary researchers from several countries; (4) we are writing two articles to be published in national accredited journals in Indonesia as a form of dissemination of the results of this study and to expand the scope of promotions regarding Ainu folklore and culture in particular and Japanese culture in general. In addition, we are glad to inform that our students in the Japanese Department in Bali have started to show their interest on Ainu oral tradition for their thesis.

The action we plan for the future is to continue further our attempt to introduce Ainu folklore to both university and high school students more broadly both in Bali and West Java, as well as beyond. We will do this in various forms of activities, for example giving general lectures that perform the theme on Ainu folklore and culture.

With this step, we hope that the knowledge of Indonesia's young generations, especially in the two provinces mentioned which are the research targets on the culture of oral traditions of specifically Ainu folklore and Japanese culture in general will be broadened. In the other words, young Indonesian people are able to know the richness of Ainu folklore in particular and Japan in general more than merely 'Kintaro' and 'Momotaro' stories.
